If you're a birder like me, bucket list destinations like Central America, Africa or the Far East spring to mind, where everything looks and sounds exotic. Talk about opportunities to build your life list.

My wife and I are planning a trip to Alaska this summer – our first. We're hoping to see Orcas, grizzly bears and Tufted Puffins, to name a few. Our sense of urgency not only relates to the size of our bucket list, but also to the increasingly rapid transformation of the Alaskan landscape due to climate change. Penobscot Valley Chapter field trips are fun ways to meet likeminded people, while enjoying the rich natural heritage of our region. We hope you will come outside and join us!

### **SEAL ISLAND PUFFIN CRUISE**

Sunday, July 7, 2:30-8:00 p.m., \$75 adults/\$45 under 12 Leaders: Sandi and Bob Duchesne

Seal Island National Wildlife Refuge, nineteen miles south of Stonington, offers ideal habitat for a large colony of Atlantic puffins. Razorbills, black guillemots, common and Arctic terns, and common eiders also nest here, and it's the southernmost breeding colony in the world for the great cormorant. (Leach's storm petrels nest on Seal Island as well, but they are nocturnal foragers that huddle in underground burrows during daylight hours, so we are unlikely to spot one.) Northern gannets and common murres are occasionally seen diving for fish in the rich waters that surround the island. Periodically, a hungry merlin or peregrine falcon will make a pass in search of a seabird meal. Join Sandi and Bob Duchesne for an enchanting afternoon-into-evening sea cruise around Seal Island – and yes, you can expect to see lots of harbor seals and gray seals, in addition to puffins and a wide diversity of other bird species. If we are VERY lucky, we may be able to spot the red-tailed tropicbird, a native of South Pacific waters, that has returned (inexplicably) to Seal Island for the past fourteen summers! Meet your trip leaders at the ferry terminal in Stonington at 2:30 p.m. The boat leaves at 3 p.m., and this will give us all a leisurely time to park, pack our carry-on bags, meet and greet, use the restroom, and scan the harbor before departure. Dress warmly, and please bring your binoculars and/or camera! If you are interested in ride-sharing, please call Sandi at 207-827-3782 and she will try to match you with others from your local area.

Note: Space is limited, and this trip often fills quite early. Please make your reservations directly with the Isle Au Haut Boat Company, 207-367-5193, and tell them you are with the Penobscot Valley Chapter group. If you want more information about the trip, please call Sandi at 207-827-3782. The boat's primary function is daily ferry service to Isle au Haut and it has an enclosed forward cabin with large viewing windows, so poor weather is rarely a factor in determining whether or not the trip will run – and the puffins will be there, rain or shine! However, if the trip is cancelled by the Captain for weather or any other reason, you will receive a full refund.

### WATERBIRDS OF ESSEX WOODS

Saturday, August 31, 8:00-11:00 a.m., FREE Leader: Bob Milardo

Despite its loud and busy location adjacent to Interstate I-95 in the heart of Bangor, Essex Woods is a surprisingly productive marsh. It is used by many bird species for breeding, foraging, and resting during the spring and fall migrations. In late summer, it's not unusual to spot transient great egrets and shorebirds here, in addition to multiple duck species, pied-billed grebes, green herons, and great blue herons. Warblers and various other songbirds line the

### FORESTRY FOR MAINE BIRDS

Presented by Maine Audubon staff: Sally Stockwell, Director of Conservation and Annica McGuirk, Conservation Associate

Maine Audubon is working collaboratively with forest landowners and managers, from small woodlot owners to large-scale commercial harvesting enterprises, so they can operate in ways that sustain or even improve breeding and foraging habitat for at-risk bird species and other wildlife. Bird-friendly forestry can still provide a good return on investment, and many landowners and managers have embraced the Forestry for Maine Birds (FFMB) program as a way to profitably harvest timber while retaining their land's value as a bountiful wildlife resource. Maine's working forests serve a dual purpose as highly productive "baby bird factories" and wildlife corridors, and FFMB gives landowners and managers the information they need to protect or enhance significant wildlife habitat as an integrated component in their forestry plans. Sally and Annica will present highlights from Maine Audubon's step-by-step technical handbook for developing a birdfriendly forestry management plan. They will discuss the field workshops offered statewide by Maine Audubon and its partnering organizations to train professional and amateur foresters in FFMB management techniques, and share success stories from people who have adopted FFMB plans to manage their woodlands.


